Monday 22nd St. Cecilia, the patroness of music and musicians, was a second or third-century Roman Christian Martyr. According to tradition, she refused to worship the Roman gods and was beheaded.

Tuesday 23rd St. Columban, (also known as Columbanus) was born around 543. He became a monk of Bangor and later principal teacher there, In 591, desiring to 'go on pilgrimage for Christ', he set out with twelve companions and came to Burgundy. He established monasteries at Annegray, Luxeuil and Fontaine according to the severe Irish rule. Later he founded Bregenz in Austria and his greatest foundation at Bobbio, near Genoa, where he died in 615. He is remembered as one of the greatest of the Irish missionary monks.

Thursday 25th St. Catherine was martyred in 310 at Alexandria. Her body is venerated at the monastery on Mount Sinai. The patroness of students, philosophers and craftsmen working with wheels.

St. Clement, third successor of St. Peter as bishop of Rome. His relics were brought to the church of San Clemente in Rome.

St. Colman, Patron Saint of the Diocese of Cloyne and of its cathedral in Cóbh. Saint Colmán of Cloyne (530 – 606), also Colmán mac Léníne, was a monk, founder and patron of Cluain Uama, now Cloyne, County Cork, and one of the earliest known Irish poets to write in the vernacular.

Saturday 27th St. Fergal, lived first in France and then in Bavaria, where he founded the monastery of Chiemsee. He was appointed Bishop of Satzburg around 754 and died in 784, leaving a reputation for learning and holiness.


