Feast days of the week in the month of November

Tuesday 9th The Church of St. John on the Lateran in Rome is 'Mother and Head of all the churches of the City and the World'. It is the cathedral church of the Bishop of Rome, and was called 'St. John' after the two monasteries once attached, dedicated to St. John the Divine and St. John the Baptist. It is however dedicated to the Most Holy Saviour.

Wednesday 10th Pope Leo I, also known as Leo the Great, was bishop of Rome from 29 September 440 until his death. Pope Benedict XVI said that Leo's papacy "was undoubtedly one of the most important in the Church's history." He was a Roman aristocrat, and was the first pope to have been called "the Great".

Thursday 11th St. Martin of Tours was born in Hungary in 316, Bishop of Tours, apostle of rural Gaul. He was an officer in the Roman army. He converted to the Christian worship that was his deep belief from his childhood. During a night watch in Gaul, he met a beggar and gave him half of his coat that he cut with his sword. Patron of France, soldiers, beggars and inn-keepers.

Friday 12th St. Josaphat 1580-1623, was a Polish-Lithuanian monk. Worked for the reunion of Ukrainian Catholics, his murder by those who opposed it brought about many conversions.

Saturday 13th St. Frances Cabrini. In 35 years, despite many obstacles, St. Frances founded 67 institutions dedicated to caring for the poor, the Abandoned, the uneducated and the sick.


