Feast days of the week

Monday 17th St. Anthony, died 356, 'Father of monasticism,' lived a life of solitude but also attracted many others to form communities of hermits.

Thursday 20th Pope Fabian was the bishop of Rome from 236 to his death 250, succeeding Anterus. A dove is said to have descended on his head to mark him as the Holy Spirit's unexpected choice to become the next pope. He was succeeded by Cornelius.

St. Sebastian may have been a solider and was martyred in the persecution of Diocletian. He sustained many others in their trials. He is patron saint of archers and athletes and those who desire a saintly death.


Friday 21st St. Agnes, wealthy and beautiful was martyred for her virginity in the last persecutions in Rome, in the early fourth century. Patron of betrothed couples, gardeners and young girls.

Saturday 22nd St. Vincent, deacon of the church of Saragossa, Spain, martyred in 304 in Valencia after prolonged torture. Vincent's dead body was thrown in the sea in a sack, but was later recovered by the Christians and his veneration immediately spread throughout the Church.

According to legend, after being martyred, ravens protected St. Vincent's body from being devoured by vultures, until his followers could recover the body. His body was taken to what is now known as Cape of Vincent, a shrine was erected over his grave, which continued to be guarded by flocks of ravens.
